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Neonates, defined as infants ≤ 1 month old, or preterm infants within 30 days of their term due date, often visit EDs with vague and nonspecific symptoms and signs that may not point to a specific diagnosis. For example, respiratory distress can be caused by pulmonary or cardiac disease, generalized sepsis, abdominal pathology, or metabolic disorders.

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2. Introduction Neonatal emergencies are not uncommon problems. They appear either at the time of birth, during the in-hospital post-birth period, or at home within several weeks of discharge. In all instances they present significant diagnostic and treatment challenges to the clinician, and must be taken seriously.

Neonatal cardiac arrest is predominantly caused by asphyxia; as a result, initiation of effective ventilation remains the mainstay of initial neonatal resuscitation, whether in the delivery room or in the few weeks after birth.

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But emergency care for an unresponsive infant, who may be only a few hours or even minutes old, is vastly different from the care a 12-year-old needs. The tools, dosages and expertise needed to diagnose and treat infants are specialized, and, therefore, any hospital with a neonatal care unit needs a code that brings its neonatal physicians and nurses to the emergency department immediately.
